

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AN ADDRESS TO THE MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY OF BALTIMORE.

Brethren and Friends,

EARLY in the year 1799, a female member of the congregation of St. Paul's Church, in the city of Baltimore, communicated to the Clergy of the parish and to several of her fellow-parishioners, some ideas, which she had long cherished, of an Institution for the maintenance and education of poor female children. Her plan being thought by those, whom she consulted, both good and feasible, they determined, that proper applications should be made to the members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the parish, and their subscriptions solicited, for carrying into effect the laudable object.

To the honour of the female sex be it told, that persons of that sex only undertook the laborious and not always pleasant businesss of procuring these subscriptions. Their exertions were crowned with such success, as to induce a belief, that their benevolent views would be accomplished; and those, who had subscribed, were invited to assemble at St. Paul's Church, in order to organize a plan for the completion of their scheme.

In consequence of this invitation, a respectable number of the subscribers assembled, elected twelve ladies managers, for the future conducting of the business, and caused a publication to be made of the fundamental principles of the Institution. They also appointed a committee to prepare a constitution for its government, and took the necessary steps for procuring additional subscriptions, and for obtaining a proper piece of ground, and erecting thereon a suitable building. In due time further subscriptions were obtained, a constitution was enacted, a lot procured, and a house

crected. It was thought advisable, that it should be at some distance from the city, and a lot of 5 1-2 acres near the seats of Wm. Gibson and Jas. H. McCulloh Esquires, was purchased at \$ 120 per acre; on which a convenient house was built, with as much economy, as could be conveniently practised. But, although there was no useless consumption of time, it was June 1801, before it could be opened for the reception of

those, for whom it was designed.

In the mean time, on the application of the Managers, the General Asssembly incorporated the male founders and supporters of the Institution, under the title of the Benevolent Society of the City and County of Baltimore. The Charter gives exclusive privileges to no religious denomination; it prescribes the sum, which the amount of the Society's estate shall not exceed; it appoints the time for their annual meeting; it gives them authority over the children consigned to their care; it authorizes the Trustees to bind them out, when they see fit, till they attain the age of 16 years; and it gives to the Society leave to enact their own rules and regulations. Under this charter the Society met and organized themselves, on the 26th day of February 1800; when they re-enacted their constitution with some amendments, and chose seven Trustees, who afterwards assembled, and agreed upon such standing rules, as they thought proper and necessary. The constitution and standing rules have since received sundry amendments.

Under this charter and constitution the affairs of the Society have been since conducted. The Trustees chosen in pursuance of the former, and the Managers, appointed in compliance with the latter, have exerted their best endeavours to promote the prosperity of the Institution. They have been industrious in procuring it benefactions; in their admissions into their school they have given the preference to the most distressed; they have carefully attended to their education; they bave fed and clothed them comfortably, while they have

never lost sight of decent frugality; and as the children arrived at a proper age, they have placed them under the care of honest and reputable persons.

. The purchase-money of the land has been fully paid, and a sufficient deed for the premises received and recorded. In order to obtain a shorter and better road from the school to the city, the Trustees consented to give, as their proportion of the expense, about half an acre of their ground; and by an exchange of a small piece with one of their neighbours, they have improved the figure of their lot, and brought the whole within one general inclosure, which is still a good and substantial one.

The house, although more than sufficient for the number of children, whom it accommodates, has been entirely finished. The unoccupied part has been several times let, for part of the year, to careful tenants, and has reimbursed a part of the original cost; and till the state of the Institution shall justify the Trustees in increasing the numbers of the objects of their Charity, they will embrace every proper opportunity of making it thus useful. But, at present, the state of their funds obliges them to limit the number to eighteen, which, however, they are sometimess under the necessity of exceeding. These funds arise from occasional donations, from the yearly subscriptions of about fifty benefactors, and from annual collections made in St. Paul's and Christ Church.

The Matron of the school is Mrs. Charlotte Clemmons engaged at a salary of \$8 per month, and removable at the pleasure of the Managers. She is assisted by a maid servant, employed at the monthly stipend of \$4.

During two years a physician was employed for the Institution, who supplied the necessary medicines, and charged for these and his attendance \$50 per annum. At present, the medicines are supplied by the Trustees, and medical aid is gratuitously administered from time to time, by physicians of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

On the 1st of 'January last, the Society was entirely clear of debt; and the amount of their funds consisted of

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from large and liberal donations of living persons, they intend to appropriate to what they may deem the best advantage.

But the interest of the above funds, including the legacies vet to be received, together with the subscriptions of the annual contributors, and the collections in St. Paul's and Christ Church, are far inadequate to the support of the Institution; while the Trustees not only deprecate the idea of lessening the number of the objects of the Charity, but are anxious to increase it. Influenced by these sentiments, they respectfully but earnestly call upon all those, whom they address, and who may not have rendered to the Institution that aid, which their circumstances may have enabled them to give, beseeching them to add their fostering protection to that, which others have afforded. One of the noblest uses, to which wealth can be applied, is the promotion of human felicity; but in few modes will this object be better advanced, than in the present, which has for its aim to draw indigent female children, at a tender age, from the haunts of vice, to rescue them from nakedness and hunger, to preserve them from ignorance, that prolific parent of evil, to imbrue their minds with virtuous aud religious principles, to train them in habits of industry, and to render them useful members of society, instead of leaving them to become its scourges and burthens. The reflection, that we have succeeded in preserving only one such object, will infinitely overbalance any worldly satisfaction, which may arise from the disposition of our substance : How much greater then must it be, to become the nursing fathers and mothers of numbers of such helpless beings! On the bed of death, it will smooth our pillow, it will alleviate the natural terrors of dissolution, and inspire us with additional courage to meet its embraces.

The Trustees present these considerations not only to those, from whose bounty their Institution has hither to derived no aid,—they not only make this respectful appeal to their humanity, but they also address them-

selves to those, whose occasional benefactions have rendered them indeed considerable assistance, but who are not regular contributors to the maintenance of the Charity. While they are ignorant of the extent of the support, on which they may reasonably rely, they cannot venture to augment their expenses, by enlarging the number of their tender wards. The trouble attendant upon the management of the Institution, is too great to permit the Trustees and Managers to make frequent personal applications for subscriptions. Both these difficulties would be obviated, if those, who are blessed with the means, would become annual contributors of such sums as they may think proper. And as the term's of subscription bind contributors for no longer time, than suits their own pleasure, they would not, by such a measure, burthen themselves with an expense, from which they would not be able to retire. While, on the other hand, the directors of the Institution would be able to form a tolerably correct idea of the extent, to which they might carry their benevolent views. Subscriptions will be thankfully received by any of the. Trustees or Managers, and by them faithfully applied to their object.

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It is not intended, that this part of the address should have any allusion to those, who have both made valuable donations to the Society, and are annual subscribers to their funds. To these the Trustees and Managers, in behalf of the helpless children under their guardianship, return their heart-felt acknowledgements; praying that their noble example may be universally imitated, and that their charity may ascend, a sweet memorial in their favour, to the throne of grace.

It is proper, however, while the Trustees solicit assistance for their humane Institution, that they should give an account of its principles, for the information of those, whose acquaintance with it may not be as intimate, as might be desired. They therefore subjoin the following copy of their constitution and standing rules, as far as the latter may be necessary to due information.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BENEVOLENT SOCIETY OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF BALTIMORF.

ARTICLE 1st. There shall be a general meeting of the Society on the first Monday in January in every year, in St. Paul's Church; of which meeting, notice shall be given in St. Paul's and Christ-church, on the preceding Sunday; and special meetings may be called, whenever Trustees appointed by the Society, may think them necessary.

2d. At the meeting aforesaid, the members attending shall elect by ballot, from among the male contributors to the Institution, nine Trustees, any five of whom shall be a quorum; whose duty it shall be to manage its concerns, to order the expenditure of money, and to form necessary contracts. They shall meet as often as they may see fit, shall make such regulations, not repugnant to this constitution, as they shall think expedient; and shall do all such things, not otherwise provided for, as may appear to them of use to the Charity. They shall hold their places for one year, and until the Society shall elect a new set; and in case of a vacancy in the Board, the remaining members shall fill it.

3d. The Trustees, as soon as is convenient after their election, shall choose from among the female members of the Protestant Episcopal Church, who are annual contributors to the Institution, or the wives, sisters, or daughters of annual male contributors, twelve Managers; and the immediate superintendance thereof shall be in the said Managers and the officiating Clergy of the aforesaid Church. They shall meet, at such times and places, as they may agree upon; and four of the Managers, with both or either of the Clergy, shall be a quorum for transacting business. In case of a vacancy in the Board of Managers, the same shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board; and vacancies in both Boards shall be deemed to arise from resignation, absence from the United States, or for four

months from Baltimore-county; from habitual inattention to duty, or from confirmed inability to discharge it.

4th. The Board of Trustees shall organize itself, according to its own discretion. They, as well as the Managers, shall receive donations and subscriptions. The former shall keep a record of their proceedings; and, at every stated meeting of the Society, they shall

report a state of their affairs.

5th. The Managers shall have the power of admitting children into the Institution, of choosing the necessary instructors and assistants, removable at their pleasure, and of making such rules and regulations for its internal government, as they may think likely to conduce to its order, regularity, and well-being; the same not being rapugnant to any thing herein contained. But when it may be necessary to bind out any of the children, this shall be done by the President of the Trustees, at the request of the Managers; who shall not require him to bind out any child, till she shall have attained the age of 12 years; or, if she should be less than languagers old, till she shall have made such a proficiency in spelling and reading, as he shall think equal to the intent of the Institution.

6th. In the admission of children, the most indigent shall be preferred; but if there should be applications for the admission of two children, in similar distress, at the same time, and but one vacancy, and only one of them should have been baptized in the Protestant Episcopal Church, then the preference shall be

given to such child.

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7th. The children admitted into the Institution, shall be wholly under the control of the Managers and the Clergy. They shall have them fed and clothed, shall cause them to be taught to spell and read, and when the funds may admit, if they shall think it expedient, shall also have them instructed in writing and arithmetick. They shall also cause them to be employed in such useful occupations, as may enable them, in due

time, to procure for themselves a maintenance, and to assist in supporting themselves, while in the Institution. At a proper period, they shall have them bound out, till they attain the age of sixteen; and they shall endeavour to procure a station superior to that of common domestics, for those children, who may have shown extraordinary capacity and merit.

8th. As often as it may be practicable, the person or persons, appointed to instruct and take care of the children, shall accompany them to one or both of the *Protestant Episcopal churches; and while there, shall endeavour, that they behave themselves with pro-

priety.

9th. Every female annual subscriber of five dollars, and every male subscriber of fifty dollars to the support of the lastication, shall be entitled to vote annually for Trustees. Every subscriber of one hundred dollars, or who shall have paid to the Charity one hundred dollars in any term not exceeding ten years, shall, if a member of the Protestant Episcopal Church, have the further right of placing one child in it, for every such subscription. Those, who shall have paid fifty dollars, shall receive from the Trustees certificates thereof, and of the rights, which they have thereby acquired; and similar certificates shall be given to such, as shall have paid one hundred dollars, in a term not exceeding ten years.

10th. This constitution may be altered in the following manner. The alterations shall be proposed, at one general meeting of the Society; and if they be approved of, by a majority of those present, another meeting shall be called, by notice given in the churches, and if the alterations shall be approved of, at the second meet-

ing, they shall be valid and obligatory.

Viz : those under the direction of the Vestry of St. Paul's

ENTRACT FROM THE STANDING RULES OF THE TRUSTEES.

2nd. The Trustees, at their first meeting after their election, shall choose by ballot a President, Secretary, and Treasurer: these shall continue in office, till the next election of Trustees.

5th. The Treasurer shall receive the monies of the Society, and pay the orders of the Trustees: it shall be his duty to give receipts for all monies paid him, on account of the Institution: and all the receipts given to the Managers, and to any collector, whom the Trustees may appoint, shall be deposited with the Secretary, to serve as vouchers in the examination of the Treasurer's accounts. He shall, at every stated meeting of the Board, furnish a statement of the money, which he has received and paid, during their recess.

7th. When the Managers admit any children into the Institution, they shall require, from the person or persons placing them therein, a written declaration properly witnessed, that they resign them to the care and direction of the Society. They shall, as far as they may be able, keep in a proper book, an account of the names and the places of birth and abode of the parents of the children; and of the names, ages, and places of birth of the children; also a description of their persons. They shall also keep an account of their proceedings, to be laid before the Trustees, when they may require it.

10th. The visitors for the time being, shall have the power of renting the yacant part of the building of the Society, while it may remain in their possession, and shall cause such improvements and alterations to be made therein, as may be indispensably necessary to the better accommodation of the tenant, to whom they may have let it.

11th. The Managers shall order the improvement of the garden and other ground, in an economical manner; and the visitors for the time being, shall lend them all necessary aid in their power.

13. The Trustees shall visit the school, not less than once a month, by a rotation to be settled at the first meeting after the annual election; and the Secretary shall notify each class of the commencement of their tour of duty.

14th. The Treasurer having passed an account, shall deposit it, and the vouchers thereof, with the Secretary.
