Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

The Managers' of the Union Protestant Infirmary, in presenting this their Second Annual Report, to the citizens of Baltimore, deem it unnecessary to enter into any argument to show the necessity for the existence of such an institution. Some of the reasons which led to this effort were stated in last year's Report, and the demand for such an establishment has been felt for years past, by every one familiar with the records of suffering and misfortune in our midst. The experience of another year has deepened our conviction of the importance of this enterprize, and strengthened our purpose, to persevere until it shall be brought to the period of vigorous maturity, and the ideal shall be fully realized of a large, commodious, well-planned and judiciously regulated Infirmary, under the harmonizing influence of the different Protestant Sects.

Although in our past history, we have found much occasion for encouragement, there are yet many difficulties to be overcome, which, to the unstable and faint hearted, appear insurmountable. But wherever the Divine Being sets His seal of approbation, there the Cross is plainly inscribed, and as we cannot expect to wear the diadem of immortal glory, until the warfare and struggle of life is over, so neither may we triumph in the possession of any real good, without a degree of effort and sacrifice, uncongenial with our love of ease.

Already, we have had many evidences that much practical benefit to suffering humanity has been accomplished, though on so limited a scale of operation. The case of Ellen O——, a girl rescued from the lowest depths of degradation, and ill of consumption, has excited much interest. It was long before the light broke into a mind previously shrouded in ignorance, but the persevering efforts to lead her into the knowledge of the truth, were at length rewarded by indications of a hopeful character. As her end approached her mind centered on the Friend of Sinners, and in dying she exclaimed in a voice audible through the room, "Come Jesus."

Several others who seemed to be in great concern for their salvation, were, before passing into the shades of death, enabled to trust with humble confidence in the merits of their Redeemer.

Our interviews with Mrs. S.—, who was for nearly a year a resident of our Infirmary, were always peculiarly satisfactory, from the deep spirit of piety manifested. That contented and thankful spirit and that patient submission in suffering which are among the most beautiful features of true religion, were her marked characteristics. A short time before her decease she exclaimed in great agony, "I know this is from a Father's hand, and soon He will say to me, 'Child it is enough, come up higher.'"



Another individual who came into the institution with a painful disorder, and unexpectedly recovered during his stay, was led to the careful perusal of the Scriptures, and awakened to the error of the doctrine he had been accustomed to hear preached. He afterwards wrote a letter to the President of our association, in which he expressed his grateful appreciation of the benefits he had received, and his desire that the lessons he had learned, might never lose their influence over him through life.

In ministering to the temporal and spiritual wants of these, we can truly say, that we, ourselves, have found a blessing, a luxury of enjoyment such as nothing earthly can have power to afford. Such, and others of a kindred character are among the advantages that have been reaped by those connected with our Infirmary, and we feel impatient to enlarge the sphere of our operations, and to exert that wide-spread influence which such an Institution, on a large scale, is calculated to exercise. Our feelings of humanity, of benevolence, and of religion, are all enlisted. Who can foresee the far-reaching results that may follow such an establishment, in which large numbers of the sick are annually cured, and sent forth into the world, after having been brought under the healing moral influence of that Book which is the source of the highest wisdom and morality?—

Within the last few months the funds of our Institution have been increased by the munificent legacy of \$5000, bequeathed by our esteemed and much lamented friend, Mrs. William H. Graham, and an additional donation of \$1000, by a distinguished friend of our cause.

The Managers having a fund subscribed and in hand, amounting to about \$8,000, the Trustees have purchased a commodious lot, in a salubrious situation, convenient of access, and are about to commence an Infirmary Building, on a scale commensurate with the necessities of our growing and thriving population.

From this statement, we find that during the past year, the total treated was 62. Remaining from last year, 10.—Admitted this year, 52.—Of these there are cured, 33.—Died, 10.—Relieved, 8.—Same as at entrance, 6.—Under care, 5.—62.

Each patient remained in the hospital, on an average, 66 days, and the daily average of patients was 11.5.

We are happy to bear testimony to the unremitting attention bestowed upon the patients in the Infirmary, by the Superintendent, Mr. Faucett.
