The following are notes for guidance only; use them as a starting point for revising:

- Look at the various images, cartoons that we have studied. Would you be able to write analysis explaining what ideas they represent, debate, reflect on?
- What are the key arguments of Crevecoeur's essay?
- What arguments have you read that supported slavery?
- What arguments do you know about that supported women's participation in political decision-making?
- Thinking of the First Nations texts we have read, would they qualify as "American" narratives?
- Re-think the *Narrative of Frederick Douglass* in light of the activity we undertook in the seminar
- What arguments were proposed in favour of women's education?
- For the close reading section: go over the various passage we examined in the seminars
- What is American Exceptionalism?
- Can you identify representations of characters that are normative, non-normative, anti-normative?
- Do you understand the significance of setting in the various texts we have read?
