Explication de texte (French Commentary)

Guidelines for FR109 University of Warwick Rebecca Powers T2/T3 2016

- I. Exposition (10%) Choose one or two of the following bits of info:
- 1. Who is the author?
- 2. Give a little information about the text (when was it written or why?)
- 3. What genre is this?
- 4. Situate the passage within the larger text.
- 5. Give us some background on the scene.

II. Development (70%)

What is the **question/problem** you are exploring?

Looking at the mechanics of the passage, how does it work **to express the theme**? Choose the criterion that seems to be the most important to the functioning of the text. Explain why you chose this criterion. Your question is your thesis. It is NOT a conclusion, but what is at stake in your discussion.

*Don't focus on WHAT the author is saying, explain HOW and WHY (s)he is saying it.

Possible Criteria (choose just one for a short commentary):

- 1. Action
- a. are there multiple episodes in the passage?
- b. how are they connected?
- c. is this a self-contained set of actions or connected to others?
- 2. Characters
- a. how are the characters described?
- b. are they in conflict with one another and how?
- c. Are they believable?
- 3. Style
- a. Are there different registers being used?
- b. What is the register (epic, familiar, poetic, tragic, comic)?
- c. how does the style support or set in motion the action?
- 4. Structure
- a. How is the passage divided? (actions? Style? Characters?)
- b. relationship between different phenomena
- do they work together or are they in opposition? Does this create irony?

III. Closure. (20%)

What can this close reading bring us to understand that a simple summary or paraphrase would not have been able to do?
