# ARMED POLICE STOP ROBESON MEETING CLASH

## EX-SOLDIERS' MARCH

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT  
NEW YORK, Sunday.

Elaborate police precautions to-day prevented rioting at Peekskill, 25 miles from New York, between Communists and anti-Communists at an open-air concert at which Paul Robeson, the pro-Communist Negro singer, appeared.

Fifteen hundred armed police, helmeted National Guards (Army reservists), sheriffs and detectives, equipped with tear gas were on duty. They were backed by firemen, who were prepared to use their hoses.

The police watched 1,500 ex-Service counter-demonstrators march past a crowd of 15,000 at the concert. There were catcalls and heckling, mostly from ex-Servicemen, and some minor clashes.

A week ago, at the same place, a Communist attempt to hold a similar concert was broken up by anti-Communist war veterans. This led to a three-hour riot, but the New York Communist party and satellite groups determined to hold the concert to-day near the same spot.

Police to-day broke up a charge by veterans who tried to fight their way into the concert ground. An attempt by a man to ride on horseback through the ring of Communists preparing Robeson was foiled.

Large quantities of baseball bats, golf clubs, home-made truncheons and other improvised weapons were surrendered to the police by demonstrators. While Robeson sang the veterans marching round the concert ground tried to drown his voice by chanting, beating drums, blowing bugles and sounding motor-car horns.

# EX-G.I.s BREAK UP ROBESON SHOW

From C. V. R. THOMPSON: New York, Sunday

**A**N angry crowd of ex-G.I.s broke up a Paul Robeson concert in the woods of suburban New York last night, and caused a riot which lasted 3½ hours and involved 5,000 people.

The concert was to have been held at a picnic ground outside Peekskill, a village where Royal Navy crews rested during the Battle of the Atlantic.

It was planned to raise funds from local Negroes for a Left-wing Harlem political group.

The organisers asked for police protection after the Peekskill Evening Star front-paged an editorial calling on its readers to boycott the concert because Robeson's "so-called concerts turn out to be political rallies." Robeson's politics are not popular in America except among Communists.

But there were only four deputy sheriffs there at dusk when the first members of the audience arrived.

Instead of the voice of Robeson the audience suddenly heard fife and drum music.

## WAVED BROOMS

It came from four brass bands which led ex-Servicemen—and the local fire brigade—to a counter-rally. Their orders were to march up and down outside the picnic ground and play like hell.

Some marchers carried banners with slogans "Down with the Communists." "Communists not wanted." Others waved brooms with a placard reading "Sweep the Communists out."

As they marched along the dusty, dirt road the bands played patriotic songs like "America the Beautiful," and "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Suddenly another tune clashed with theirs. The Robeson audience was singing a Negro spiritual, sometimes used as a political pop song—"We shall not be moved."

The marchers rounded the last bend in the narrow road to find a

phalanx of the singing Robesonites obstructing them.

The ex-G.I.s turned over cars as roadblocks, then took the offensive.

They forced an entrance to the picnic ground, and someone turned off the floodlights.

A group marched on the stage and made a woman pianist, shivering despite the 90 degrees temperature, play "Yankee Doodle," then the U. S. National Anthem. And they knocked down anyone who did not stand still.

## CARS WRECKED

Another group fought their way to the stage, tore it apart, and started a bonfire. Above the noise could be heard the shrieking of women running into the woods to hide.

The marchers stopped cars, turned a dozen of them over and immobilised the rest by pouring sand into the petrol tanks.

A traffic jam, nearly five miles long, was so dense that it took the 50 police called out to reinforce the deputy sheriffs three hours to get there. As soon as they did, the fighting stopped.

Robeson, warned of the riot, did not turn up.
