Relevant Research and Experience

With Persons in Vulnerable Contexts or with Special Needs

Nov. 2009 - June 2012 Homeless Persons - Throughout my time at Cambridge I co-lead a student 'street outreach' group, which provided food and support through active listening to approximately 30 members of the street-life community each week. Many of the homeless had problems with alcohol, drug and/or mental health problems and were sometimes volatile, but through patience and sensitivity, we developed many positive relationships over time. In my second year, I designed and conducted a qualitative research project on homelessness in Cambridge, via semi-structured interviews and participant observation. This research utilized my ability to establish rapport with people of various backgrounds.

July 2012

Women with Eating Disorders - Accepted an invitation to spend a week at The Eden Unit, a clinic in Aberdeen specialising in eating disorders. Interviewed 10 of the women about their ideas and experiences of having children, to determine whether more formal research on this sensitive topic could be conducted in the unit.

May 2012

Infants in Higher Risk Contexts - I have a special interest in the care of infants with complex needs, and their caregivers, often with complex needs themselves. I trained last Spring in the NBO, and gave a presentation to over 70 attendees on the importance of early interventions and supporting families of pre-term infants. I volunteered last year in a crèche for infants and toddlers of teen-aged parents, and participated in several sessions with infants and toddlers of caregivers accessing a Postnatal Depression Service. My MSc dissertation and PhD project centre on an intervention used to support newborns and their caregivers and an evaluation of its effectiveness when used with families in developing-country contexts.

May - June 2012

Children of Young Parents - I heard about a social inclusion centre in Cambridge in the last months of my time in Cambridge and was accepted to volunteer in the crèche of the Young Parents' Programme (YPP). I then spent 3 hours each week there for several weeks, and relished my time looking after the infants and toddlers while their mums took a parenting course.

October – May 2012

Children with Autism Spectrum Diagnoses – In 2011, I was selected as a team member at the Centre for Family Research (University of Cambridge) for a study of theory of mind and executive functioning in families of children with and without an Autism Spectrum Disorder, which is aiming to develop and test interventions for children with an ASD. I was, along with another student, responsible for recruiting participants, and travelled to schools in Cambridge, London, and Wales for two sessions of data collection with each of the children. Working directly with more than 60 children (both typically developing and of varying degrees of ASD) required patience, persistence, creativity, and energy, and was extremely rewarding.

In Promoting Awareness and Social Inclusion

Oct. 2010 – April 2011

Social Inclusion of Homeless Persons - Interviewed students about their perspective on student engagement with the homeless community in Cambridge and produced a podcast for the website of the leading student newspaper to accompany an article published in the paper and in a Newnham college magazine about what students can do to make a difference. I also interviewed on a local radio show in 2010 on the issue.

February - April 2010

Cancer Research Promotion - Organized a fundraising and awareness campaign through the St. Baldrick's foundation for cancer research in April 2010, by committing to have my head shaved. To gain support and sponsorship, I wrote letters to motivate friends and family, produced two music videos, and utilized social networking. I sought support from a local barber who did the shave free of charge. Over £3,000 was raised.
