Postgraduate Economics WARWICK

- The structure of postgraduate research programs varies slightly across institutions
- Standard structure:
 - 2 years of modules (MRes) + 3 or 4 years thesis (PhD)
- In many countries MRes and PhD are formally integrated into a single PhD program (e.g. US)
- Some UK universities may offer access to the PhD directly from a MSc but top programs will require you to take first the Mres/MPhil (e.g. Warwick, LSE, UCL, Oxford)

Why a PhD in Economics RARWICK

- Possible professional outcomes
 - academic career
 - Research vs Teaching positions
 - international organizations (IMF, World Bank, central banks...)
 - private sector (economic consultancy, tech firms)
- Best thing you can do with your life according to some of your professors but ...

Large and uncertain investment Ick

- High opportunity cost: median 6 years
- Challenging in many respects (lonely, stressful...)
- Academic market is very competitive
 - 1st job market; then tenure-track!
- Uncertain
 - some great students make awful researchers and the other way around
 - You may be more or less lucky with projects

Application process



Deadlines

• US:

 December (e.g. Harvard Dec 1, Stanford Nov 29, MIT Dec 15...)

- Europe:
 - December-February (e.g. LSE Dec 14, UCL Jan 13, Warwick Jan 15, EUI Jan 31, CEMFI Jan 31...)

What do you need for your armick application?

- Good marks from a good institution
- 2/3 (informative) reference letters
- GRE prepare well
- English language certificate (if applicable)
- Personal statement/research proposal
 - Note: nobody expects you to implement the research proposal
 - You may signal interest in the place

How to get a good reference letter?

- Your master thesis advisor
- Have you done RA for somebody?
- Instructor of a course where:
 - You got excellent marks
 - You were active in lectures, office hours...
- Reputation of reference letter writter matters
- Note: reference letters will be sent directly

To which institutions should you apply?

- Ask your reference letter writters
- Apply to many places!
 - Large fixed cost, relatively small marginal cost
 - Uncertainty in admissions
 - Large returns to good programs
- Check also 2nd tier
 - Some smaller places might be a good match for you, even if they are not so well-known?
- Good departments offer financial aid but
 external aid may be beloful (positive signal)

Gap year?



- Application deadlines are in late fall
- No marks available yet + no reference letters from your current professors at Warwick
- Two possibilities:
 - Apply this fall (you can try again next year)
 - Wait one year (gap year working as a Research Assistant, can prepare better for GRE...)
- Note: If you apply to Warwick we will check your 1st term marks

Department of Economics

- High quality
 - Consistently ranked among the top-30 departments of the world
 - 2nd best in the UK according to REF 2021
 - 55 top-5 publications within the previous 6 years
- Large department
 - Around 65 researchers
 - Expertise in many fields
 - Around 70 Mres + PhD students
- Low teaching loads for faculty & high faculty/student ratio
 - High availability

Admissions: Warwick MRes/PhD WARWICK

- 400+ applications
- Each year 15 students admitted
- Distinction at MSc and/or 1st Class Honours
- GRE not compulsory but desirable
- Outstanding references (2 academic)
- No research proposal required
- English language requirements (<u>Band B</u>)

Programme structure



• The structure of the programme is quite standard:

2 years of modules (MRes) + 4 years thesis (PhD)

• In many countries MRes and PhD are formally integrated into a single PhD program (e.g. US), in UK formally these are two different programmes.

• EC9AA The Practice of Economics Research



 Five elective modules (including up to 2 external modules)

- Advanced Economic Theory I

- Development Economics
- Economic History

- Advanced Econometrics

- Industrial Organisation and Data Science
- International Economics

MRes programme structure WARWICK

- 1. Five elective modules
- 2. MRes Dissertation

Progression to PhD conditional on academic performance (above 65 marks)



WARWICK THE UNIVERSITY OF WARWICK

Progression Criteria

- Second Year to Dissertation: pass the Summer Project and all option modules
- MRes to PhD:

 - At least 60% average in core modules (1st year)
 Achieve an average of 65% over all taught modules in year 1 and 2
 Achieve a mark of at least 65% in the dissertation.
- Past statistics:
 - In a cohort of 15 people, typically 0-3 do not progress to the PhD
 Better to figure out early is academia is not for you

WARWICK

Departmental Scholarship

- Full fee waiver
- A basic stipend of circa £18.5k (2+4 years), adjusted with inflation
- Additional payment for teaching, invigilation, marking
 - Around 3.5k yearly
- Additional support for conferences, experiments, data acquisition etc
 - Individual fund: £1,500
 - Internal competition: yearly budget around 50k)
 - Job market: £1,200
