• Strategic Project: Warwick Innovative Teaching and Learning

2015/16

Funding of just under £19,000 was applied for and received from IATL to begin the assembly of an online resource and manual of practice which concentrates on innovative teaching and learning practices at Warwick University. As part of the study, previous modules and practice will be reflected upon, lessons will be observed, and staff designing and leading innovative modules and the students on them will be interviewed individually and as part of focus groups in order to capture their experiences. The project will also involve the hiring and supervision of undergraduate and postgraduate students to aid and develop research. Finally, the lessons learned throughout the year will be applied in order to develop an entirely new

innovative module for 2016/17: 'Philosophy of Sport'. Two events will be run during the year: 'Innovative Pedagogy at Warwick' and 'Philosophy of Sport'.

• Strategic Project: Applied Imagination

2014/15

'Applied Imagination' is an interdisciplinary module with Warwick's Institute of Advanced Teaching and Learning (IATL). Funding of just under £18,000 was applied for and received from IATL to create and develop the module and to conduct and disseminate research. Academics from a variety of departments as well as practitioners from theatre and industry were brought together to present students with theories of imaginations and creativity. Students were then given support in innovative forms of assessment. Research and events will also be conducted in the wake of the module.

• Academic Fellowship: Ethics and Children's Literature

2014/15

Funding of £7,500 was secured from Warwick's Institute of Advanced Teaching and Learning to plan and develop an interdisciplinary module for the 2015/16 academic year around ethics and children's literature. This will include research into the areas and running events to gather feedback on ideas and test lecture/seminar structures with students.
